CHAMPIONS

In the B team competition, Broughton had to face **Longridge B, Our Lady's B and Archbishop B**. **Mr Wallace** set his team up for a counterattacking style of play and **Jack Nelson** scored to beat Longridge 1-0 in the opening game. Things were equally close in the second fixture against Our Lady's with **Jamie Baines** this time scoring the only goal of the game to again win 1-0.



Broughton went into the last game knowing that a draw or a victory would be enough to win the B Team Finals. On an early counter, Archbishop scored a well taken goal to see Broughton go behind for the first time all tournament. The team did not panic and stuck to their tactics with a gutsy midfield performance from **Oliver Heath** who worked tirelessly to break up play in midfield. With six minutes to go, Broughton drew level with a good drive and finish from **Josh Dawson** surging out of the right back position. With just two minutes remaining, the Broughton pressure was finally rewarded as **Bailey Malliband** neatly took a good cross and stayed cool in the box to pass past the keeper. Broughton won 2-1 and were crowned the **Preston Schools' B Team Champions**.

The A team competition was less straight forward with Broughton facing **St Cecilia's A, Longridge A and Our Lady's A**. In the opening game against St Cecilia's, Broughton dominated possession and missed some early chances to score. St Cecilia's capitalised on this and hit twice on the break to **beat Broughton 2-0**. The second game against Longridge was a very even game with both teams competing to get the win. **Pele Smith** scored a crafty header to win the game 1-0, with Longridge having a goal disallowed for having too many players on the pitch. Broughton had to win the final game against Our Lady's who had beaten us earlier in the year 4-0. Our Lady's started well down the left wing and scored early. Things did not look good. The boys stayed determined and slowly started to compete, **Charlie Bray** then hit a thunderbolt strike after a good through ball to bring the game back to 1-1. Our Lady's continued to press before **Bobby Shorrock** received a good pass and finished calmly to win the game 2-1. After all the games had been played, **Broughton and Our Lady's were tied on six points each**. **Broughton were crowned Preston Schools' Champions following the crucial win over Our Lady's**.

Christmas is an incredibly busy and rewarding time in the Music Department and our pupils, once again performed extremely well, taking part in a wide range of festive performances.




