Last week I led assemblies to all year groups on the theme of 'Is this the best you can do?'. I shared with everyone numerous, anonymised pairs of examples from different pupils of

low/high quality work. With effort, application, concentration and attention to detail, every pupil is able to produce carefully planned, detailed, accurate and well-presented answers. There is no excuse for careless, rushed and below standard responses. I talked

about **high standards** and every pupil taking a pride in their work. I explained that it is absolutely essential that everyone adopts a strong work ethic because, invariably, this equates to success and achievement.

I routinely visit classrooms every day, but from now on the focus will be on ensuring every pupil is producing the highest quality work they can in Art, English, French, Science, PE and so on. Teachers will identify those pupils who are working below the expected standard and we will make you aware of this fact. If appropriate, we will insist a piece of work is completed again - properly.



1. Take an interest.

Ask your son/daughter what they are **learning** about in History, Music or French. Look at their books/work. Comment on **presentation**. Ask what they **enjoy** about a particular subject.



2. Ask about homework.

Check their planners. A routine is always best for homework. Very soon we will be launching a 'Firefly' app which will enable you to see all homework. Check that the quality of homework is at least equal to work produced in school.

3. When your son/daughter is **revising**, insist they do it **somewhere**

Test them on what they have re-learned.

without distractions. No devices and **no social media**.











5. **Praise whenever you can**.

If your son/daughter has spent a great deal of **time and effort** on a particular piece of work, they really like it when this is noticed.



Put simply, just **take an interest**. I realise that some teenagers may be reluctant to talk about their school work, but do persist. **Your support and active involvement makes such a difference**. Latin Expressions

Approximately (circa) half of our language derives from Latin and there are still many Latin expressions in common use.


- 1. **Ad lib:** derives from the Latin ad libitum, literally 'according to pleasure'. In other words, making it up as you go along.
- 2. **Ad nauseam:** 'until nausea', usually in the sense of 'on and on until the listener is bored'.
- 3. E.g: exempli gratia, 'for example'.
- 4. **Modus operandi:** 'way of working' for a person or organisation.
- 5. **NB: nota bene** which literally means 'note well'.
- 6. **Per annum or p.a:** 'each year', usually used to refer to salaries and often abbreviated, as in £50,000 p.a.
- 7. **Per capita:** literally means 'by the heads', as 'the equivalent per capita annual income is £24,000'.
- 8. **P.S: post scriptum**, 'after writing'. Used if you want to add something to a letter or document after you had finished it.
- Quid pro quo: 'something for something', giving something back in exchange for something else.
- 10. **Status quo:** 'the existing state of affairs' means leaving things exactly as they are.



MAKE YOUR OWN SEED BOMBS!



Last week our gardening club got their hands dirty making bird food seed bombs. These are a great alternative if you don't have a feeding table but want to help nourish your local wildlife in these harsh winter months!





If you want to make your own seed bombs at home you will need:

Soil

Flour (if your soil is clay rich you won't need this)

Water

Mixing bowl

Tray

Bird seed

Method:

- 1. Mix 10 parts soil to 2 parts flour.
- 2. Slowly add water and mix slowly until the mixture becomes sticky like dough.
- 3. Roll into a golf-ball size ball.
- **4.** Fill a tray with bird seed.
- 5. Roll your mud balls around until covered in seeds.
- **6.** Leave to dry for a day or two and then they're ready to throw in your garden.
