No leggings or socks over tights
Plain white shirt with stiffened collar (not fitted)
Sensible plain black shoes, not canvas, no trainers, no logos (heel not to exceed 5cms)

For Boys:

Grey trousers with logo

Plain white shirt with stiffened collar (not fitted)

Plain black or grey socks

Sensible plain black shoes, not canvas, no trainers, no logos

Piercings: One pair of plain studs in the ear lobe.

No nose piercings or piercings higher up the ear are allowed and clear plastic piercing retainers are also not allowed.





1. In trigonometry, $\tan x^\circ = \frac{\text{opposite}}{\text{adjacent}}$, $\sin x^\circ = \frac{\text{opposite}}{\text{hypotenuse}}$, $\cos x^\circ = \frac{\text{adjacent}}{\text{hypotenuse}}$

After you complete a degree, you'll do a postgraduate qualification in archives or records management recognised by the Archives & Records Association (ARA).

You'll usually need some relevant work experience to apply for a postgraduate course. This is a great way of finding out if a career as an archivist is for you.


Library News


Year 7, 8 and 9 pupils with their new books
