Dear Parent/Guardian,

Happy New Year to you all. I hope you have all had a restful and relaxing Christmas break and have managed to keep safe and well during the festive period.

It was wonderful to see the children return to school today after the Christmas holidays. The atmosphere around school today has been excellent and it was a pleasure speaking to so many children about their Christmas experiences and their plans for the New Year. On the final day of term, Mr Bailey conducted 'Rewards Assemblies' where over 1000 certificates were given out to pupils in all years for 'Excellence' and 'Effort' in lessons. Form Tutor, Head of Year and Headteacher Awards were also given out to a number of worthy winners. Congratulations to all the children who received awards for last half term. My message to all pupils is to keep giving your best every day here at Broughton.

I am pleased to announce that our Governing Body has elected a new Chair of Governors after the recent retirement of Mrs Judith Fawbert after over 25 years in the role. Mrs Martine Morris, who has been a member of the governing body for a number of years, has had two daughters who were pupils at Broughton and has been our SEND link governor for the past few years, will now take up the post. I am sure you will join me in congratulating her on her new position and wishing her good luck. You may also remember that we advertised for a parent governor last term. I am pleased to announce that we had one candidate, Elizabeth Hamilton, who will now take up this position. Elizabeth has a wealth of experience in education and also has a son in Year 8. Many thanks for committing to this role Elizabeth, I am sure your work on the governing body will make a significant difference to the lives of the pupils here at Broughton.

Through our fundraising efforts last term, we are now able to donate £1361.63 to our chosen charity which is Teenage Cancer Trust. Thank you to all the pupils who have supported this charity through the non-uniform day and the number of reward points that were earned, each point equating to 1p. We will be asking the pupil council to choose a new this charity this week for the Spring term and I will inform you who this will be in next week's newsletter.

The theme for this week's assemblies is kindness and I will be asking the children to reflect on when they are kind to others and how they can use the power of kindness in their everyday lives. I hope through the assemblies I can remind them of the importance of kindness to each other, especially whilst using social media.

We received information from the Department of Education that, from Sunday 2 January, face coverings are to be worn in classrooms where pupils in Year 7 and above are educated. The advice is short term only, to support pupils and teachers as they return to school this term and builds on the existing proportionate guidance that recommends face coverings for all adults in communal areas of all settings. The advice on face coverings in classrooms will be in place until Wednesday 26 January, when Plan B regulations are currently scheduled to expire, at which point it will be reviewed. As a school we will be

asking teachers and pupils to wear their masks unless they are exempt until we receive further guidance on or before the 26<sup>th</sup> January. Hopefully this will limit and reduce the spread of infection and assist us in ensuring both staff and pupils are able to attend school without having to isolate.

We have a busy term ahead with parents' evenings for Years 7, 8 and 10 and Mock Exam results for Year 11 pupils on Friday 14 January. Information will be sent out to you before the parents' evenings to inform you how to book your appointments and access the meeting on the evening. Attendance at parents' evening is extremely important and will give you an opportunity to discuss your child's progress and how they are doing in school. Please make every effort to attend, our attendance figures for parents' evenings are always well above 90%.

Pupils will be arriving home with coloured badges for their blazers today. Each year group will now be easily identified which will help us daily in school, especially in the slight staggering of lunches for pupils which we are trialling at the moment to speed up the lunch service at school. In addition to this, our new catering facility is nearing completion and we are hoping to open this in the next few weeks which will also ensure pupils can access their lunch much quicker.

As always please can I ask you to be courteous of our neighbours in Broughton village when you drop your children off in the morning and pick them up at the end of the day. Please do not park over driveways or block access and where possible turn off your engines to reduce emissions. Your help in this matter is greatly appreciated. ### **Career Opportunity**

### **School Aged Flu Vaccination Programme**

IntraHealth are commissioned to provide the school flu vaccination programme, protecting school-aged children aged 4-15 years on 31st August 2021 (Reception-Year 11).



Any child who is in an at-risk group can be vaccinated with the GP or as part of the school's programme.

IntraHealth visit every school for a main flu vaccination session, and then once more for a catch-up, which is arranged for later in the season. There are also planned Community clinics provided in every area for those who miss the offer at school.

### Smart TV / **Streaming** services

There are so many TV streaming services available now such as Netflix, Prime, Apple TV, Now TV and Disney as well as more families having Smart TVs, which connect to the internet and allow you to download apps and access YouTube for example. This means our children potentially have access to a lot more content, some of which may not always be appropriate to watch.

If your child does access content through these services then, as always, make sure you set parental controls so they can only view content that is suitable for their age.

Each service will have their own parental control settings with most of them using a Parental PIN so you can restrict what can be viewed (and purchased in some cases).




### **TikTok**

You must be over 13 years of age to use TikTok.

Users can watch musical clips, record clips (it includes lots of lip synching and dancing), edit them and add special effects.

### Why should I be concerned?

You need to be aware that some of the videos may contain explicit language and sexual imagery, which may not be suitable for your child to view. There is also the risk of strangers contacting your child so make sure you have set up the appropriate settings.

Even with a private account, your child's profile information such as their photo and bio are still visible so ensure your child understands the importance of not adding personal information (e.g. location, age and phone numbers) to this area. This allows parents to link their own TikTok account to their child's account. This will allow you to set controls such as restricted mode (limit the appearance of inappropriate content) and screen time management (control how long they can spend on TikTok each day). ### Fortnite

### An update

Is your child playing Fortnite? It is rated PEGI 12 for frequent mild violence which means it is not suitable for persons under 12 years of age.

It is important to remember that when rating games, PEGI do not take into consideration the communication features of a game. Fortnite does include a chat facility, which adds further risks.

#### What is Fortnite?

There are different versions of Fortnite, including a free-to-play Battle Royale game (although money can be spent within the game) where up to 100 players compete against each other.

#### What do I need to be aware of?

- Chatting to strangers and inappropriate language: Fortnite
  contains voice and text chat. Due to the nature of the game, your
  child may be chatting to strangers and may hear inappropriate
  language. Ensure your child knows how to report players for any
  inappropriate behaviour.
- In app purchases: All users can purchase V-Bucks directly through the game. This currency can be used to purchase items in the Fortnite store so make sure you don't store your payment details within the game/device and restrict purchases.

### **Parental Controls**

Fortnite includes several parental controls to help you make it a safer environment for your child including disabling voice chat, filtering language and setting privacy settings.
