Dear Parent/Guardian,

As the half term draws to a close this Friday it is important to take time to reflect on the efforts of the pupils over the last six weeks and commend them on their hard work, resilience, ability to cope with change and patience as things start to return to normal. I am impressed on a daily basis by the way our pupils behave in lesson, work hard and use excellent manners throughout the day. As mentioned in last week's newsletter, attendance is returning to normal and the daily proportion of pupils not attending school is becoming fewer day by day. Regular attendance at school is the most important way you can ensure that your child is best placed to make the necessary progress towards their potential here at Broughton.

Today we have been informed about the final plans for our Year 11 pupils and their exams at the end of the year. It has been an uncertain time for this Year group and with this information we can now plan the comprehensive preparation and support for every member of Year 11. The after-school revision sessions will start on Monday 21st February from 3pm until 4pm and will run until the end of this half term. We will also be holding a 'Help Your Child Revise' evening for parents on Thursday 24th February at 6pm to share some important messages and tips for purposeful, organised phone free revision. Each parent will be given their son/daughter's personalised plan for revision on this evening. The **Year 11 Parents' Evening will now be held on Thursday 31st March.**

This week Mr Brady will be speaking to all pupils in assembly about 'Online Safety'. This is something that affects us all as our children can potentially be exposed to upsetting and harmful content through their phones, tablets, laptops and Xboxes. With children spending a considerable amount of time on social media platforms such as Instagram, Snapchat and Facebook it is important we all take time to monitor usage to ensure there are no incidents of unkindness, name calling or behaviour that could be deemed as unacceptable. I know the monitoring of our children's phones is a challenging task but spending a few minutes every few weeks to talk to your children about their phone and social media use will help our young people cope with the demands of a digital world.

Our work towards the 'Lancashire Equality Mark' continues at pace and we are still on track to achieve the first two awards for Religion and Belief and Sexual Orientation by the end of the year. Through lessons, learn it challenges and assemblies we continue to remind the pupils and educate them about equality for all and the importance of tolerance and respect for everyone and their individual differences.

This Friday we will be holding our end of half term reward assemblies where pupils will receive awards for excellence and effort in their individual subject areas. Pupils will also receive Form Tutor, Head of Year and Headteacher awards in recognition of those who have 'gone the extra mile' since our return in January. Over 100 pupils received their 'Bronze' badges last week for achieving 100 reward points or more this academic year. If a pupil receives 200 reward points, they will receive a 'Silver' badge and at 300 a 'Gold' badge. Anyone progressing onto 400 points will receive the highest award of a 'Platinum' badge. These points will accumulate over the time the pupils are with us at Broughton High School and will not be reset each year. Well done to the pupils who received their 'Bronze' badge last week.

Having met the whole team on Friday morning and presenting them with the highly sought after 'Broughton High School Pen' and a 'Freddo' chocolate bar it was clear to see how enthusiastic this group of pupils are.
