Dear Parent/Guardian,

On Friday, I had my first day away from school since I started last April, to attend the National School Leaders conference in Birmingham. The main speaker, Natasha Devon, who is a campaigner for Mental Health, Body Image and Wellbeing in young people, opened the conference. She gave a very clear message about the digital world our young people live in and the need for schools and parents to be able to spot the signs in our young people of when they are struggling and the need for us to build strategies to help them cope with the demands of being a teenager in 2022. Mobile phones, social media and perceived extra pressure from parents, friends and teachers played a significant part in the presentation and it is important we are all aware of the signs of mental health deterioration and poor wellbeing in our young people. It is difficult for us as adults to fully understand the pressures of social media and the effect this has on the mental health of our young people but signs to look out for could be:

- Continuous low mood, sadness and tearfulness
- Showing feelings of hopelessness and helplessness
- Being irritable and intolerant of others
- Little or no enjoyment of things that were once interesting to them
- Increased social isolation
- Disturbed sleep patterns

There is always someone to talk to at school and we constantly inform the pupils never to 'suffer in silence' but if you ever have any concerns as parents please always call us at school and we will do everything we can to help. We have a very strong pastoral team at Broughton and an excellent school counsellor and we are always available to talk.

Continuing with my theme from last week about the use of mobile phones, we will continue to treat any breaches of the mobile phone policy extremely seriously. This policy is in place to protect pupils and staff and to ensure mobile phones are not a distraction to learning and friendships in school. Any inappropriate use of phones, including sending pictures, videoing, unkind messages will be dealt with extremely seriously. Phones must be out of sight and turned off between 8.30am and 3.00pm in school. If any pupils have any issues or concerns they must tell a member of staff, use the safe@broughton messaging service or inform their parents who can then contact the relevant Head of Year. Please can I ask you for your continued support in ensuring that Broughton High School is a mobile phone free school.

I am sad to say that we will be losing Mrs Tillotson from our Design Technology department from the end of the summer term. She has been appointed as teacher of GCSE and A-Level Textiles at Queen Elizabeth School in Kirkby Lonsdale. We will be sad to see her go but wish her all the very best of luck when she takes up her position in September.

Congratulations to the Year 10 Netball team who have won the league and tournament double this year. I am told that their performances have been exceptional and I will be meeting them all this week to congratulate and reward them on their achievement.




Installation of MS Office
