Dear Parent/Guardian,

Last week, it was a pleasure for members of the Senior Leadership Team to spend some time in the English department as we conducted a 'Focus On' English. Having spent time observing the pupils in a significant number of lessons, and talking to some pupils individually, it is clear to me that there is a vibrant and hardworking learning atmosphere within the English Department. Pupils were challenged to think hard and work both independently and in pairs and it was clear in all the lessons we visited that the children were extremely engaged. It was wonderful to see that that there was a real shared passion for English and that the pupils felt happy and secure in their lessons. Needless to say, this was all supported by excellent behaviour and manners from every single pupil. This process is something we have done with every department this year and in every case, it has proved to be an extremely positive experience.

I would like to say thank you to the members of our governing body who have been working very hard behind the scenes to support our continued journey of school improvement. As well as meeting regularly, governors have been visiting school and meeting with the individual department or subject leaders that they are linked with to gain an even deeper understanding of how each department operates. This process has been extremely beneficial for all involved and contributes to our overall aim of providing the best possible opportunities for our pupils.

Our end of year exams and assessments are fast approaching for Years 7-10. Over the next two weeks we will be providing all pupils with a revision plan and a timetable along with a simple planner for them to organise their revision time efficiently. I found that sitting with my own children to plan their revision period and agreeing some 'house rules' in advance about revision was extremely productive. Simple things such as turning off mobile phones during revision to avoid distraction and taking regular breaks can significantly help with concentration and retention. Mr Brady will be holding 'How to Revise' assemblies next week for all pupils in Years 7-10. In class, teachers will also be sharing ideas about the most effective ways to revise with their pupils.

I have reminded staff this week about the importance of ensuring pupils record all their homework in their planners. Homework continues to be an extremely important part of further developing the pupils' understanding of the topics currently being covered and I know how hard parents work to ensure that your son/daughters' homework is completed to the highest standard. Your support is always appreciated.

Please can I ask you to continue to encourage your son or daughter to read at home. Research continues to show that reading every day shows benefits such as mental stimulation, vocabulary expansion, memory improvement, better writing skills and stronger analytical and thinking skills. It also gives pupils valuable time away from a mobile phone or a computer screen. At Broughton High School we have an amazing library that is filled with an exciting stock of books suitable for all pupils of all ages. Please encourage your child to visit the library this week and see if there is a book that they are interested in. Our wonderful Librarian, Mrs Whitlock will be happy to help!

Congratulations to Daisy Lee who has qualified for the National Schools' Golf Finals after performing exceptionally well in the Lancashire School Tournament last month. She will be playing the final at Dundonald Links at Troon in Scotland in May. Congratulations also to Sam Willingale who has again been selected to play cricket for Lancashire this summer. A wonderful achievement and a real honour. I am

sure you will join me in wishing them the very best of luck. Our football teams have again performed exceptionally well this year with the U12 Girls', U14 Girls', U14 Boys' and U16 Boys' for reaching the Preston Schools' Cup Finals to be played at Deepdale on Sunday 8th May.

The girls' teams have also reached the Lancashire Cup final which is an unbelievable achievement. The U16 girls' match will be played on Tuesday 10th May (5pm) at AFC Darwen; the U12 girls' match will be played at St Bede's in Blackburn on Thursday 26th May (4pm). Textiles

Years 7, 8, 9

- 1. Scissors that have a zig zag edge to help prevent fraying are called **pinking shears**.
- 2. A **1.5cm seam allowance** is the safe distance to sew from the edge of the fabric to ensure your stitching is secure.
- 3. The **presser foot** on the sewing machine has to be lowered gently before you begin to sew.
- 4. When fabric scissors are used to cut paper, it **blunts** the blade.
- 5. To ensure that all seams are on the inside of a product, you must sew with 'right sides' together.
- ✓ write them down ✓ say them out loud get someone to test you
- 6. **Pinning** is when you join fabrics together in a temporary way using pins so they do not move when sewing.
- 7. You should insert your pins at a **90 degree** angle to the edge of the fabric.
- 8. **'Fish Tail'** is a style of fitted dress which flares out from the knee.
- 9. **Applique** is the term used to sew different decorative pieces of fabric together to give a creative finish.
- 10. The two key directions of thread that are woven together to make a piece of fabric are called warp and weft.

Pupils in Years 7, 8 and 9 will be tested on these facts during form time next week.


