Year 7 Cricket

The Year 7 Cricket team have kick started their season with back to back victories in the Lancashire Cup. Their first game saw the team travel to Birkdale, Southport. Broughton batted well with opener **Hugh Smith** scoring quickly and was backed up well by **Muhammed Quasi**. Broughton eventually took the victory in the penultimate over of the game.



In the second round, we faced Queen Elizabeth Grammar School, Blackburn. Again, they won the toss and opted to bat first. Broughton's bowling attack went to work early, bowling the open batter out in the second over of the game. **Tommy Swan, George Brame, Hugh Smith, Ellis Wilkinson, Rayhan Mohamed** and **Max Burge** all bowled extremely well and QEGS scored 83 runs off their 20 overs. Broughton's batting was much improved from the first game, the non-striking batter looking to attack and all batters talking at the crease. Broughton won the game with **Arthur Freye** scoring the final runs in the 13th over, after hitting three, 4s off his leg side.

The boys are now in the 3rd round to be played on the week beginning 6th June.

The team now go on to face Bury Grammar School.

English Schools' Athletics Championships

This week Broughton took the U13 and U15 boys' and girls' Athletics team to the prestigious ESAA Athletics Championships, in Blackpool. Having not competed in any outdoor athletics since summer 2019, this was a new experience for over 50 of our pupils. However, all athletes were amazing and represented the school exceptionally well.

On the day, there were also some outstanding individual performances, with **Riley Stansfield** (100m/Shot), **Hugh Smith** (800m), **Isaac Allen** (Hurdles/High Jump) and **Austin Allen** (200m) all breaking six Broughton High School records; some of our records still stand from as far back as 1977.

The U13 boys' team came out overall winners scoring 378 points and **now go through to the North West Final** on the 16th June in Stretford, from which the winners go to the National Finals in London.

The **two girls' teams and the U15 boys' teams have also qualified for the County B Finals on the 15th June, at Blackpool Stanley Park**, after finishing 5th, 6th and 7th. Again some standout performances from **Sophie Mitchell** (1500m), **Cerys Allen** (Long Jump/800m) and **Antonio Leeming** (800m).

Good luck to all four teams in the next round.

Garage Trades are very popular career choices - and with over 31 million vehicles on the road, there's always a demand for skilled and semiskilled workers. Because it's popular work, you can expect a lot of competition in getting started, so it's important to do some preparation and finding out about the job first.

Overview of the role. A motor vehicle technician services and repairs vehicles. They work on all the systems found within the vehicle. The nature of the work ranges from replacing simple parts through to solving complex faults with the use of diagnostic methods and equipment. Today's apprentice has to demonstrate expertise in the technical side of their role. They must have strong problem-solving skills and a good grasp of the theoretical and practical aspects of a vehicle's systems. The growing complexity of today's vehicles, and the pressure to deliver a high-quality customer experience, requires the retail automotive sector to attract and train high calibre individuals and this is reflected in the elements of the Standards.

LIGHT OR HEAVY?

Light vehicle mechanics service and repair faults on cars and small vans. They account for half of all learners. Car mechanics/fitters work in all sorts of garages and workshops. Some are modern and spacious, with up to date equipment; many are traditional and small. Most mechanics work for garages which service and repair cars for private and business customers. You might work mainly on just one or two makes of vehicle if the garage has the local franchise, or you might deal with all types.

Heavy vehicle mechanics work on lorries, trucks and buses. Some companies and organisations, which own a lot of vehicles, such as haulage contractors and coach companies employ their own mechanics to look after the fleet.

PROGRAMME DURATION

It is expected that it will typically take three years for the apprentice to attain the required level of competence in the workplace although it may be less if the individual already has significant training and practical experience.

STANDARDS

Assessment will include employers and training providers reviewing an apprentice's progress via assessments at gateways 1 and 2. These assessments are designed to review the apprentice's behaviour, knowledge and skills against set gateway criteria. In addition, the apprentice, employers and training providers are required to maintain an E-Log book evidencing progress over the duration of the apprenticeship. Level 2 Functional Skills will also be achieved and a final End Point Assessment (EPA) will be taken.
