Dear Parent/Guardian,

I hope you have all had a restful and healthy half term.

The last day of term saw our first rewards assemblies where pupils received certificates and prizes for their effort and achievement in class so far this year. Class teachers for every class in Year 7-11 nominated pupils for effort and achievement in their subject and there were Pastoral awards from Form Tutors, Heads of Year and the Headteacher awards. In total just over 1000 certificates were given out. 5 pupils were also lucky enough to find a 'Golden Ticket' underneath their chair in the assembly which allows them to go to the front of the dinner queue with a friend for the rest of this half term. The message to all pupils was 'well done' and to 'continue to give your best' every lesson every day.

Thank you to all parents of Year 7 pupils who participated in our 'Virtual' Year 7 Parents' Evening just before the break for half term. 'Attendance' was extremely high which highlights your commitment and willingness to be involved in your son/daughter's education. It is highly likely this 'virtual' format will continue to be the format for all parents' evenings throughout the year.

As the weather has become colder, a number of pupils sensibly choose to wear outdoor coats to and from school. May I remind you that our school uniform policy states that any coat must be either predominantly plain black or blue. Hoodies, fleeces and scarves have never been part of our uniform and they are not permitted.

If your son or daughter comes to school by bike, it will help if they are as highly visible as possible. Lights on a bicycle definitely help, as does the wearing of high visibility jackets or bands. If your son/daughter cycles to/from school, please remind them of the importance of road awareness and safety. Pupils must always pay attention to pedestrians and road users, and they should always stop and check for oncoming traffic at junctions. We want all pupils to arrive and depart safely.

The overwhelming majority of your sons and daughters arrive to school on time, ready for the beginning of the day at 8.40am. They look smart, alert and eager to learn. As all pupils know, if anyone arrives late they have to attend a 'same day' break detention. Punctuality is such an important lesson for life beyond Broughton and we are determined that everyone arrives to school on time.

We are still exploring the possibility of a late bus to service the areas of Catforth and Inskip. Thank you to the families who have expressed an interest in this service. If there are any other families that would utilise this service please can you let Mrs Sweeney know by email no later than this Friday, 5th November.

Please can I ask you to continue to be considerate to the community and residents around school when you are dropping off or picking up your son/daughter at the start and end of the school day. Please be mindful of other road users, cyclists and pedestrians. There have been times where parking on Woodplumpton Road has blocked the pavement so prams and wheelchairs have been unable to pass. Your continued support is greatly appreciated.

Grand Theft Auto (GTA)



GTA is rated 18+ by PEGI (a couple of versions are rated 16+), this is largely because of bad language, violence, glamourisation of crime and the depiction of drugs. GTA is not suitable for those under this age.

What do I need to be aware of?

- Mature content
- In game chat
- In game spending make sure your bank account details are not linked.

Squid Game – rated 15+

Have you heard of Squid Game? It's one of Netflix's latest releases about a group of people participating in a series of children's games in the hope of winning a large cash prize. It has been **rated 15** by the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC). The BBFC focus on helping you choose what is appropriate for your family to watch. Due to its current popularity, content from this show can be found on numerous other platforms such as YouTube, TikTok and Roblox, so your child may come across this show without even viewing it on Netflix. Content may range from trailers of the show or content that other people create such as memes, reenactments and games.

What can I do?

Parental Controls

Set up appropriate parental controls on your broadband, devices and on individual apps.

Talk

Chat to your child about age ratings and why this means certain programmes are not suitable for them to watch.

Individual Profiles

Set up child profiles on any streaming services to ensure your child is only viewing content appropriate to them.

Reporting

Make sure your child knows how to report and block on all platforms that they use.

Explore

Watch and explore things online together so you can see what your child is doing and how to support them.

Your child's online life

There is so much that we can do online nowadays including playing games, chatting with others, watching TV or sharing our videos/photographs. Being online can be great but it's important that we set boundaries for our children to keep them safe whist they



explore being online, develop their digital resilience and understanding of what to do if anything negative happens when online.

So how can we help keep our children safe? We can start by checking age restrictions/ratings. It's important that we follow these to ensure that what our children are doing or seeing online is appropriate for their age.

Where can I find age ratings?

- Films: The British Board of Film Classification (BBFC) rate films. This page includes a link to a 'Parents' Guide to Age Ratings': https://www.cbbfc.co.uk/resources/viewing-films-safely-online.
- Video games: PEGI provides age classifications for video games.
 PEGI considers the age suitability of a game, not the level of difficulty. It is important to note that PEGI do not take into consideration user generated content within games (such as on Roblox) and the chat facilities within games.
- Apps: Check the individual age ratings within the relevant app store. We also recommend that you download any apps and play them yourself to check their suitability.
- Social Media networks: All social media networks have a minimum age rating; they are all at least 13+.

What else can I do?

- Explain the importance of age ratings to your child.
- Go online together and let your child show you what they are accessing online.
- Set up parental controls on your broadband, devices, consoles and on any individual apps that your child is using. This will reduce the chances of them accessing anything unsuitable as well as viewing inappropriate content for example whilst on YouTube.
- Chat to your child regularly about what they are doing online and as always, remind your child that if anything is worrying them about what they see online then they should tell you or another trusted adult.
