Dear Parent/Guardian,

It was wonderful to see all the pupils returning to school this week after the half term break looking rested and revived and ready to face the challenges of the new half term. Attendance this week has been exceptional and I am confident this will continue to be the case over the next few weeks.

You will be aware from media reports that the National Education Union (NEU) will be holding their second day of strike action on Tuesday 28th February 2023. As such, I wanted to keep parents updated on how the strike action will affect Broughton High School on this day. As it currently stands, we will be opening the school to all year groups on Tuesday 28th February. Staff who are in school will continue to teach their timetables as normal. There will be some necessary changes to the normal curriculum for some classes but our aim is to keep pupils engaged in learning activities throughout the day. Although definite planning of the exact details of the day cannot be finalised until the start of the day on Tuesday, please be reassured that we will ensure a smooth and purposeful day for our pupils. I will keep you updated if there are any significant changes to our plans, for example if we needed to limit the number of year groups attending on the day of strike action. If you have any questions or concerns please let me know and I will do my best to respond as soon as possible.

I am pleased to announce that we appointed Jane Smethurst as a teacher of English to start with us after the Easter break. Miss Smethurst brings a wealth of experience and knowledge to our already exceptional English team and will further enhance the wonderful English curriculum that we offer to our pupils.

On the last Friday of the half term, Year 10 pupils were visited by lecturers from the English Department at Lancaster University. Over 70 pupils stayed behind after school to experience 90 minutes of 'English at University' from a superb team from Lancaster. The pupils involved were inspired by the visit and thoroughly enjoyed the experience. Thanks to Mr Alston and Miss Armstrong for coordinating this wonderful opportunity.

Today we held a cake sale for our pupils to raise money for the families affected by the devastation of the recent earthquakes in Turkey and Syria. Staff and pupils were able to buy an amazing array of cupcakes that were very kindly made and donated by one of our parents, Mrs Worth. Our aim is to make a small contribution from school to help those in desperate need of supplies and support as a result of this terrible tragedy. Huge thanks to Mrs Worth for your very kind offer and generosity in supplying a huge number of cupcakes.

We will be holding our first Year 8 Family Bingo evening which will organised by the PTFA on Tuesday 21st March 2023. There will be a range of prizes available on the night and tickets will be made available over the next few weeks. Please can I encourage you to show your support for this event. All money raised goes directly back into the children here at school.

Yesterday morning our Year 11 cohort were treated to a superb production in school of 'Macbeth' by an external drama company called Quantum. The atmosphere created by the drama company, especially when the three witches appeared on stage, was amazing and helped our Year 11 pupils further develop their understanding of the play which is a vital part of the Year 11 GCSE syllabus.

Finally, congratulations to Jack Lawson (10H), who has been selected to represent Bravo Company (North West Sea Cadets) at this year's Gibraltar Cup Competition which is taking place at the Commando Training Centre Royal Marines (Lympstone) on 17^{th} March. The Gibraltar Cup is to determine the best Royal Marines Cadet detachment in the country and I wish Jack and his fellow cadets every success in the competition.

The service **departs from Broughton at 4.25pm**, allowing pupils to stay late to complete school work or participate in sports activities after school.










Science Live

Lancashire Youth Council and Youth Focus North West Enabling Lancashire Young People to have a voice

We are writing to ask <u>for pupil support and involvement</u> in the coming 'Northwest Making your Mark' campaign 2022.

Making Your Mark (MYM)is the Northwest largest youth consultation, to decide what issues matter most to young people, with around a million young people voting on these issues. At the same time young people are encouraged to put themselves forward to stand for Member of Youth Parliament. (MYP). Young people will represent Lancashire in local, Regional and National level debates, ensuring that young people's voice is heard at every level. Putting young people at the front of decision making on youth issues.

In Lancashire we strive to ensure that as many young people as possible have the opportunity to be involved in decisions that affect their lives and the communities in which they live. We have a responsibility to support and enable this process where possible and by encouraging young people to be part of their District Youth Council, Lancashire Youth Council and UK Youth Parliament we are able to provide such an opportunity.

Lancashire Youth Council meets regularly with members of the County Council Cabinet and the Education scrutiny committee which provides a formal route for them to discuss issues with senior decision makers. The votes in school's etc will elects 5 Lancashire representatives to the UK Youth Parliament who are then responsible for ensuring the voice of Lancashire young people is heard regionally and nationally at Westminster.
