Dear Parent/Guardian,

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate our Year 11 pupils on the exceptional way they have conducted themselves this week as they have started their mock examinations. Preparation for exams can be extremely stressful for pupils but I have to commend Year 11 on their exceptional conduct this week and their attitude and positivity towards their revision. Pupils will receive their mock examination results when we return after the Christmas break on the 19th January.

Year 10 pupils received their Term 1 Progress Report this week which outlines the progress they have made since starting their GCSE studies in September. If you are a parent of a Year 10 pupil please take some time to sit down with your child and discuss this report as it will clearly highlight where there are significant strengths but also where further work or effort is required. The focus areas of the report are 'Engagement in Learning', 'Homework - Independent Study' and 'Behaviour'. These individual scores generate an overall 'Learning Score' for the term, 100 being the highest score that a pupil can achieve. If you have any questions regarding these reports please contact your child's Head of Year. Paper copies were issued on Tuesday but this report can also be found on Synergy. Pupils in Year 7, 8 and 9 will receive their first report before we break up for the end of term. Pupils in Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 will receive their end of term review next week. Please spend some time discussing your child's review with them.

On Thursday, we held our festive music concert in the school hall. Mr Shepherd hosted our annual event where our pupils showcased their musical talents. The evening was extremely well attended and it was a perfect opportunity for our musicians to be able to play in front of an audience. As well as performances from a wide range of soloists, we listened to our swing band, the beginner wind ensemble, choir and ukulele ensemble. Well done to all the musicians involved.

Sadly, we received a call late on Monday evening from our travel company who informed us that due to heavy snow and ice, Munich Airport was shut and flights had been cancelled for the staff and pupils who were about to depart on the Cologne Trip. We are assured that all families will receive a full refund but unfortunately, we will not be able to run this popular trip this year. Sincere apologies to all pupils and families involved.

On Wednesday, 13^{th} December, we will be holding our annual PTFA Year 7 family social event and quiz night. We have a huge number of families attending already but it's not too late to buy a ticket for your family. A family ticket costs £5 - payment to be made via ParentPay. There will be also be a raffle as part of the event. Any donations of raffle prizes are most welcomed and should be left with Mrs Dumbell at pupil reception or brought along on the evening.

Assemblies this week have focused on 'Talents and Hobbies' and we have asked pupils to reflect on their individual talents and to celebrate the unique skills that they all have. We also asked them to reflect on their hobbies and interests outside of school and the opportunities that arrive from 'getting involved'. Pupils were told to 'Never be scared of your ability to be brilliant' and to take every opportunity that comes their way to develop their talents both inside and outside of school.

Please can I remind all parents about the dangers of social media for our young people. The message that we give to pupils is that we always want them to be kind to each other and never to send messages that are unkind or inappropriate. I know it is extremely difficult to monitor your children's social media use but please continue to guide them and talk to them about how they should try to use their mobile phones and the varying social media platforms that they are able to access.

Finally, please can I also remind parents about dropping off and picking up at the start and end of the school day. It is not permitted to drive into the main school gate to drop off or pick up pupils (apart from after school activities) as this causes blockages with our buses and please do not park on the zig-zag lines at the front of school. Please drop children off safely, ideally at the top of the school field where they can walk down the path into school. Wherever possible please avoid picking up or dropping off on Woodplumpton Road, and at the end of Northway, as this is becoming increasingly dangerous. Your support and assistance in this matter is greatly appreciated.

- 1. Traditionally, the blues is performed in a 12-bar pattern.
- 2. Chords I, IV & V (1, 4 and 5) are used in blues music. If you were in the key of C, chord 'I' would be C, chord 'IV' would be F and chord 'V' would be G.
- 3. The full name for a piano is a 'fortepiano' because it can play a wide range of dynamics (volumes). Forte means loud and piano means soft so the translation is literally a 'loudsoft'.
- 4. The most expensive instrument in the world is the "Lady Blunt" Stradivarious Violin (made in 1721) which last sold in 2011 for almost £10,000,000!
- 5. A two-beat note is called a minim.
- 6. The long, sustained note played by bagpipes, while the tune is played on the chanter, is
- 7. The small lines that sit above or below the stave are called Ledger Lines. They are used to sit notes on, above or below.
- 8. Lots of people consider any music played by an orchestra as 'Classical Music'. However, the classical period was between approximately 1750 and 1820. Not very long at all!




