Dear Parent/Guardian,

The first half of the Spring term has passed unbelievably quickly but I am pleased to say that it has been an extremely productive five weeks. Every day, and across every year group, I am extremely proud to observe the high expectations that our pupils set for themselves. The learning atmosphere in lessons, supplemented by our excellent teachers is regularly commented on by visitors to school and is something that I experience every day on my tours around school. In addition to this, the superb behaviour, manners, presentation of work, uniform and eagerness to get involved with school life is a credit to our pupils. The pupils have undoubtedly deserved a well-earned rest over the half term. I hope they all manage to have a happy and relaxed half term break.

Last night we held our final Year 11 Parents' Evening which was superbly attended. It was an extremely positive evening where teachers where able to share the progress that pupils have made since the mock exams before Christmas and give some honest and constructive feedback to ensure each pupil prepares thoroughly for the exams in May. Unbelievably there are only 83 days until the first exam!

When we return after the half term our Year 11 pupils will access the '6 period day' extra revision slots, from 3-4pm every night, to assist them in their preparation for their upcoming GCSE examinations which start in May. This extra support has always been a huge factor in building confidence, further subject knowledge and developing exam technique with attendance always extremely high. Thank you in advance to the members of staff who will run these sessions. If your child is in Year 11 please remind them to attend each and every one of these sessions after half term. We will be launching the Year 11 online 'Revision Hub' when we come back after half term; pupils will receive details about this during their assembly on Monday 19th February.

On Tuesday evening, four of our exceptional Year 10 pupils represented the school at the Oxford Schools Debating competition in Manchester. Competing against other schools across the North West of England (mostly sixth form pupils) our children performed exceptionally well. Congratulations to Aebha Bayliss, Alice Chapman, Evie Eastham and Nina Finley.

This week Mr Brandwood and Mr Bailey have led our 'House Assemblies' where pupils in each House Beech, Cedar, Hawthorn, Nordmann, Rowan and Sycamore came together from Years 7 to 11 to celebrate their collective achievements this half term. Total synergy points, attendance and homework completion, amongst a range of other areas are collectively ranked and shared with the pupils to see what position they are in. The top performing house this half term was R. Congratulations to pupils in forms 7R, 8R, 9R, 10R and 11R – they celebrated with waffles at break time today! The House which is still the highest performer with points accumulated since the start of the academic year is C.

This half term our pupils have been awarded am impressive number of reward points in a range of categories. Reward points are given for excellent work, receiving a praise postcard, excellent homework, reading, engagement in lesson, excellent organisational skills, excellent attendance, helping out at a school event, acts of kindness and generosity, superb progress, excellent attendance at extra-curricular activities and Head of Year, Head of Department and Headteacher awards.

When your child accumulates 100, 200, 300 and 400 reward points they will be awarded a Bronze, Silver, Gold and Platinum badge to signify their achievement. The numbers for this half term are below.

Our whole school attendance continues to be significantly above the National Average, sitting at just below 96%. Last weekend saw two of our top athletes take part in the Lancashire Schools Cross Country competition at Witton Park in Blackburn. I am delighted to announce that Molly Taylor in Year 10 and Hugh Smith in Year 9 won their event against an impressive array of other locally talented runners. Both Molly and Hugh will now represent Lancashire at the English Schools event.

Please can I ask you to continue to be considerate to the community and residents around school when you are dropping off or picking up your child at the start and end of the school day. Please be mindful not to park across residents' drives, or in a position that will cause danger to other road users, pedestrians or cyclists. There have been times where parking on Woodplumpton Road and Garstang Road at the start and end of the day has blocked the pavement so prams and wheelchairs have been unable to pass. Your continued support and consideration for the Broughton Community is greatly appreciated.

Daniel Sange-Ahmed scored <u>544 points</u> - **the most in the school!**



Four of our Year 10 pupils did our school proud by competing in the Oxford Schools Debating Competition on Tuesday evening. Described as 'the biggest debating competition in the world', and run by pupils for Oxford University, it was held at the prestigious Manchester Grammar School and the pupils were up against pupils from across the Northwest, aged from 14 to 18.

We are proud to say that our four debaters (**Aebha Bayliss**, **Alice Chapman**, **Evie Eastham** and **Nina Finley**) completely held their own against what were mainly year 12 and 13 pupils, representing Broughton with enthusiasm and determination. They had fifteen minutes to prepare their arguments for or against random debate motions and they argued in British Parliamentary format, taking roles in either government or opposition. They spoke confidently and passionately and quickly learnt a lot about thinking on their feet!

Alice Chapman said, "We faced much older pupils during the debate and whilst it was intimidating, it was great to see the standard that we believe we can achieve through more


practise. So, while it was challenging in the moment, it has given us great motivation for next year."

Get Caught Reading Competition






