Dear Parent/Guardian,

Last Thursday we held our annual 'Open Evening' and welcomed a huge number of prospective families to our school. With over 300 pupils helping out in all departments across the school on the evening there was an amazing atmosphere around school. It was a pleasure to meet so many new families to Broughton but also to see so many existing families on the evening. I look forward to meeting many of them again as members of our school community next September. It was lovely to receive so many emails after the event which highlighted our amazing pupils and friendly, welcoming staff.

On Monday, we held our annual 'Open Day' which was also extremely well attended. The wet and windy weather didn't put any of our visitors off and we were inundated with guests throughout the morning. Families were shown around school by our team of expert senior pupils and were able to visit lessons and speak to current pupils and teachers. The feedback from our visitors was extremely positive.

This week, on Thursday evening, we held the first PTFA meeting for this academic year. It was a very positive and well attended meeting with a number of new Year 7 parents joining. Jacqui Bury has stepped down from her role as PTFA Chair with Anthony Mellor taking on this role. Helen Peuleve stepped down as PTFA Secretary and Amy Leyland will now take on this position. I would like to thank Jacqui and Helen for their long service and commitment to the PTFA. Thank you also to all the new members who attended the meeting; we would be delighted to see even more new members at the next PTFA meeting which will be held later in the Autumn term - details will be included in a future newsletter.

Attendance continues to be a real focus in school and we are pleased to see that our whole school attendance continues to be extremely impressive and significantly above the National Average. Attending school every day is one of the most important factors that allows pupils to make the necessary academic progress. Thank you for your continued efforts to ensure your children are in school every day. Attendance figures so far in school are:

If your child cycles to school please can you remind them that a fastened helmet must be worn at all times for the whole of the duration to and from school. As the mornings and evenings get darker it is also advised to purchase lights for your child's bike to make them more visible to drivers and pedestrians. Please also remind your child to cycle safely at all times, not only for themselves but for other cyclists, pedestrians and motorists.

Our Year 11 pupils have been completing their Geography field work at the River Wyre. Three visits were held over the last two weeks, with a total of 94 pupils studying depth, width and velocity. They have had a wonderful learning experience as a result of these trips, developing into competent Geographers whilst being excellent ambassadors for our school.

Our reading curriculum is a real strength here at Broughton and it continues to be an extremely important part of every child's development. We have made some excellent reading improvements again this year, both in lessons, as part of the 'Best of Broughton' award and also in our library. We highly value the importance of reading here at Broughton and would strongly encourage you to help your child to read as often and as widely as possible.

If you have noticed that reading at home is not as popular as it once was, here are a few ideas to get your child reading again:

- Keep reading material all over the house.
- Model reading. If your son/daughter sees you reading, conversation naturally follows.
- Graphic novels (comics) are now recognised as literature; they may be the key to getting your teenager hooked on books.
- Merge movies with books. Offer your son or daughter the print version to read before a big film adaptation comes out on film.
- Buy them a book as a present. Any number of websites recommend books for teenagers.
- Ask your son/daughter to tell you something (characters/plot/twist) about the book they are currently reading.

Any additional reading at home will definitely complement the work done in school. Reading continues to be an extremely important part of every child's development. Our library is open at lunchtime and after school (Monday-Thursday 3pm-4.15pm and 3pm-3.45pm Friday).

The standard of our pupil's uniform is exceptional. Our pupils look extremely smart every day and I thank you for your support in ensuring that all pupils wear their uniform correctly and with pride both on their way to school, during the school day and on their way home. If you are ever struggling with acquiring uniform please contact us at school and we will always help. Thank you to all parents who have sent in 'new unused' and 'nearly new' uniform and PE kit. 

The team of three girls came **3rd in Lancashire** receiving a medal and they go through to the Northern Athletics Road Relay later in the month.


Molly's individual time made her fastest in Preston and Lancashire for Under 15 girls. Very well done!


As part of the coveted Best of Broughton award criteria, pupils are required to read 3 books from their year group list.


A second Year 11 Broughton team also had an opportunity to represent the school. With little experience playing together as



Y11 Geographers Complete their River Study

Over the last two weeks, 94 Year 11 GCSE Geographers have completed the physical aspect of their fieldwork. Firstly, I must say a massive thank you to all of the staff and pupils on the visits as the weather conditions proved to be quite challenging at times to say the least. My initial worry of low water levels on 13th September, quickly changed to having to check the rainfall totals and rivers every thirty minutes! In all our years of carrying out the river study at the same location, we have never seen conditions like it. However, all pupils just seemed to take collecting velocity readings in driving horizontal rainfall in their stride. Despite the weather, we managed to carry out most of the data collection methods and collect some data which we will now analyse in class.

On Wednesday 20th September, we were joined by **Graeme Kellott, Asset Manager for the Wyre River Basin from the Environment Agency,** at the flood defences at Garstang. He explained how the drainage system works and pointed out the reflective spot underneath the bridge, which when underwater, is the sign to raise the flood barrier. It was fantastic to hear that level of specific detail which helps to bring our case studies to life.

Thank you to the staff who helped to run the days - Mr Lord, Miss Wright and Mr Ellis.


