Dear Parent/Guardian,

With the weather improving this week it has been wonderful to see the pupils out and about at break and lunchtime enjoying the dry weather and blue skies. The way our pupils interact with each and behave at these times and throughout the school day is truly impressive and it was commented on a number of times by three visitors this week who spent the day in school. There are a huge number of activities and clubs on offer at lunch time but also areas for pupils to sit and talk with their friends, play table tennis, football or chess or simply enjoy their lunch in the dining halls.

Year 10 pupils will receive their second review of the year next Tuesday. Those pupils with a learning score over 90 will receive a commendation in recognition of their efforts. Following on from this review we will be holding our Year 10 Parents' Evening next Thursday from 4pm – 7pm in the sports hall and drama centre. Last year we had just under 98% attendance at the Year 9 parents'/options evening so please make every effort to attend to find out how your child has settled into their first year of GCSE's. We encourage the pupils to come along also and listen to the feedback from their teachers. Pupils must wear full school uniform if they are attending with their parents.

On Thursday this week we were visited by Lady Milena Grenfell-Baines MBE who spoke to Year 8 about her life story. She was born in Czechoslovakia in 1929 and when she was nine years old, Lady Milena and her younger sister Eva were able to leave Prague before the start of the second world war on a special rescue train, arranged by Nicholas Winton who saved a further 669 children in this way. Lady Milena has lived in Preston for over fifty years and she came into school to share her fascinating story and the story of Nicholas Winton which has recently been made into a film 'One Life' starring Anthony Hopkins.

Tomorrow we see the start of the Duke of Edinburgh practice expeditions with over twenty of our Year 10 pupils navigating their way cross country from school to the Plough at Eaves. We have another group next weekend who will be completing their practice expedition also. Thank you in advance to the members of staff for giving their time, not only on Saturday morning but through the whole Duke of Edinburgh course. We wish them the very best of luck on their expeditions.

It has been a busy time in school with various activities organised to celebrate World Book Day. In addition to the whole school competitions and activities which included 'Bard or Batman' quote quiz, Translation of Book Titles, 'Caught Reading' photographs, Design a Book Token and 'The Masked Reader' quiz, we also celebrated by reading an Anthony Horowitz story in six parts throughout the school day today. Further details about all these activities can be found in this newsletter.

This week has seen the start of formal assessments for some of our Year 11 pupils who have completed their GCSE food practicals. Staff and pupils have worked extremely hard to prepare for these assessments and the pupils have produced some amazing, high quality dishes. Well done to everyone and good luck to the next group who will complete their practical assessments next week.

Cycling to school continues to be an extremely popular way for over 200 of our pupils to get to school. I receive regular emails and messages from members of the public about the politeness and courtesy that our cyclists show, but occasionally a pupil may forget their manners and the importance of courtesy to others whilst cycling.

I will be reminding all pupils this week about our expectations of them whilst cycling to school to ensure they keep both themselves and others safe. Please always ensure your child wears a helmet on their journey to and from school.

As always, please can I ask you to be courteous of our neighbours in Broughton village and on Northway when you drop your children off in the morning and pick them up at the end of the day. Please do not park over driveways or block access and where possible turn off your engines to reduce emissions. Your help in this matter is greatly appreciated.


A Quest to Become World Champion Language Learners



After their friend Mark's mum wins the lottery and gets a giant house with an indoor pool, Ali and Sami have been having the time of their lives hanging at Mark's house. Even their friend Aadam gets a job there, which means he can make more money for his legal battle for UK residency. But when some money goes missing, Aadam is accused of stealing it-and all three boys are unceremoniously kicked out of Mark's house in suspicion.

On top of that, Ali's dad, who abandoned the family when Ali was little, is suddenly turning up everywhere in town, and a half-brother Ali never knew has shown up at Ali's school. Ali feels miserable and resentful about it, making it hard to be a good friend.
