Dear Parent/Guardian,

I hope you all managed to have a restful Easter break with your families. It was wonderful to see the pupils returning to school this week, rested and refreshed after the Easter holiday. It has been an extremely positive first week back in school and it is clear that the pupils have returned with real energy towards their learning and involvement in extra-curricular clubs. There has been a superb atmosphere around school and in lessons this week which is something we occasionally take for granted but something that is always mentioned by the many visitors we have in school. Our pupils are a genuine credit to the school and their families.

Last night we held our Year 9 Parents' Evening and Options Evening and welcomed Year 9 pupils and their families into school. As always, it was a very positive experience for both pupils and parents and extremely well attended with well over 90% attendance on the evening. The final parents' evening of the year will be for Year 8 pupils and will be held on Thursday 25th April from 4pm. It is vitally important that pupils attend this evening with their parents to hear the important information that is shared. Pupils attending must wear full school uniform.

As well as the start of GCSE exams next week for our Year 11 pupils, our end of year exams and assessments are fast approaching for Years 7-10. Over the next two weeks we will be providing all pupils with a revision plan and a timetable along with a simple planner for them to organise their revision time efficiently. Agreeing some 'house rules' in advance about revision is always extremely productive. Simple things such as turning off mobile phones during revision to avoid distraction and taking regular breaks can significantly help with concentration and retention. Mr Webster will be holding 'How to Revise' assemblies for all pupils in Years 7-10. In class, teachers will also be sharing ideas about the most effective ways to revise in their subject with pupils.

Next week's assemblies focus on 'Positive Relationships' and we will be asking the pupils to reflect on the importance of building positive relationships with the people around them; friends, classmates, teachers and family members. We will also be highlighting the importance of using social media in a positive way and the issues that can arise from using social media in a negative way, especially in friendship groups.

For the first time this year, Broughton High School entered The Aristotelian Award research essay competition run by The Perse School Cambridge. This competition is aimed at Year 9 pupils across the UK and is divided into two sections – arts/humanities and sciences – with a choice of five essay titles in each category. The Aristotelian Award has been set up to promote the independent study skills in Year 9 pupils while simultaneously providing an avenue to explore super-curricular interests in the arts, humanities and sciences. This is the first year Broughton have participated in this and all of our entrants have performed exceptionally well. Seven pupils entered in total with Seth Wilcock achieving the outstanding achievement of finishing in the top 5 nationwide for his essay in the Science category. Seth's essay answered the question, "to what extent can we regard Nuclear Fusion as the solution to the world's energy crisis?" and was highly commended for his superb efforts. He also received a £20 as a prize. Congratulations to: Seth Wilcock, Annabel Cooke, Lucy Dewhirst, Cameron Hudson, Hemanshu Kayam, Naomi Olive and Ella Syversen.





Broughton Ski Trip 2024 – Austria

Over the first week of half-term, the Broughton ski trip once again took place as 29 pupils and 4 staff headed over to Austria for a 6-day trip filled with activities and fun. It was another fantastic trip and all pupils represented school to the highest standard throughout.

We departed Broughton in the early hours on Thursday morning and set off looking to reach our final destination of Zell Am See, Austria. This was achieved via a short flight and coach transfer from Munich airport. When we arrived at the hotel, it was a quick check in before heading straight up to have some tea from the ever-amazing buffet style spread provided by the fantastic hotel. After a brief chat about what the week ahead held in store, it was time to get some rest before the early wake up call in the morning ready to hit the slopes.

Day one brought fantastic weather, with a beautiful blue sky acting as the perfect background to show off the vast mountain range in all of its glory. After a quick ski to determine grouping for the first few days, we split off into three groups with our instructors and set about getting to know the ski resort. All groups met back up for lunch and a quick catch-up before setting about on an afternoon of practicing what they had learnt in the hours before. It was fair to say the instructors were very impressed with the way the pupils handled the new tasks given to them.



Day's 2, 3 & 4 saw all groups ski as much of the resort as possible, building up their ski miles and gaining experience of handling as many slopes as possible, with some even tackling a tricky black run after just a few hours! The weather at 2000m high is ever changing, but despite some wind, snow, a dashing of rain and beaming sun, everyone had a constant smile on their face as the progress made was fantastic from all.

Our final day of skiing saw all pupils embark on a short bus ride to the Kitzsteinhorn glacier in the local town of Kaprun. Situated at 3203m this offers not only a high quality of snow, but also some fantastic new runs to challenge all pupils. This was a test of everything that had been learnt throughout the week and both the staff and instructors could not believe how well the pupils skied that day. From moguls to carving, off-piste and yes, the occasional fall... every pupil pushed themselves and can be extremely proud of their achievement.

Aside from skiing, the glacier also offers a fantastic viewpoint that allows pupils to stand on the gantry of the highest point out over the suspended bridge and take some fantastic photos that will remain with them forever. This also provided pupils with a brilliant insight into how natural features such as mountains are made as there is a short film and information points throughout that the pupils can read in order to understand how where they were currently stood was formed.

After each day on the slopes, the amazing hotel provided some afternoon tea and the pupils had some down time before heading back up for tea. Once this had been finished, each night there was a different evening activity for pupils to enjoy. Ranging from a spa, quiz, lake walk, town visit and disco it is fair to say there was no moment without a smile or a laugh.

Once again it was a fantastic trip and a special thanks from both pupils and staff goes to Mr Bailey, who yet again has provided a memory that will last forever for everyone involved in the trip.

From all staff, we would like to say thank you to the pupils who made the trip such a positive and enjoyable experience, it truly wouldn't have been the same without you.
