Dear Parent/Guardian,

I have spent a significant amount of time visiting lessons this week, and I have to praise the pupils for their levels of commitment, concentration and hard work when they are in class. I was especially impressed with the mature manner in which all our pupils interact with their classmates and their teachers. The standard of presentation in books and in e-portfolios and the quality of homework that was completed was very impressive. Please spend some time asking your children to show you their books and the work they are completing in class. I am sure you will be impressed.

Year 7 Parents' Evening will be held on Thursday 12th October in the Junior Block building from 4pm. Each family will have the opportunity to meet with their child's form tutor to hear about how well we think they have settled into school. It is also an opportunity to hear from both pupils and parents about their experience during the first 6 weeks at Broughton. At 4.30pm and 5.30pm Mr Bailey (Deputy Head in charge of Behaviour and Safeguarding) and Mr Brandwood (Assistant Head in charge of Attendance and School Synergy) will be holding an information session that will be extremely valuable for Year 7 parents. This will be held in the assembly hall. It is expected that all pupils attend with their parents on the evening wearing their full school uniform. Last year we had 96% attendance at this event and we are hoping to improve on that figure this year. We are really looking forward to meeting you all again in a few weeks' time.

We hosted an extremely successful Hockey Festival this week where pupils in Year 7 and Year 8, from a number of schools across Preston, came together here at Broughton for some expert coaching followed by a mini tournament. This event was led by our own Year 10 Sports Leaders who were excellent ambassadors for the school and showed great expertise, maturity and confidence when leading the sessions. Well done to all involved but especially to our Year 10 Sports Leaders Alice Chapman, Tadiwanashe Chaparadza, Nina Finley, Johnny Stanley, Charlie Hamilton, Olivia Newman-Kirk, Aebha Bayliss, Sam Willingale, Hannah Wilcock and Matthew English.

Today we had over 40 pupils travel to London to take the opportunity to visit Parliament on one of the few occasions throughout the year where it opens its doors to the public. We were extremely fortunate to secure the places and the pupils were undoubtedly excited (and a little sleepy) as they set off at 5.40am this morning from Preston train station. After spending over two hours in Parliament, pupils had a quick lunch on the London Eye and then a visit to Madame Tussauds, returning to Preston just after 6pm. Thanks to all staff involved in the coordination of this exciting trip. I know the pupils will have had an amazing experience.

I am pleased to say that our in school uniform shop is thriving. Over the summer and the last few weeks, we have supplied countless families with high quality uniform that has been donated to school. Please can I ask you to continue to donate any items of unused uniform or good quality used uniform to school for us to make available. All we ask is for a small donation to school which can be paid through ParentPay to allow us to replenish stock when required.



Have you considered:

- Walking or cycling to school instead? This is a great way to contribute to a child's 60 minutes of activity a day and is easy to incorporate into your daily routine. Try it once a week at first and see how easy it can be.
- Parking nearby or getting off the bus two stops earlier and walking the rest of the way. If you live too far away to walk or need your car for your commute to work you can still walk part of the way. Adults in England should aim to take part in at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity each week.
- Car sharing is a great way to reduce congestion and save you pennies. Team up with other parents or carers who live nearby- share the cost and halve the hassle.

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A Guide to Parking Safely at Our Schools

Inconsiderate and dangerous parking around our schools has become a big problem, putting the safety of children and others at risk. We all want to keep our children safe around schools, so here are some top tips on how you can make a difference.

How can you help?

- ✓ Keep your speed down
- ✓ Turn your engine off do not idle
- ✓ Leave the middle of the road free, with enough room for other road users to easily pass through
- Make sure your child leaves and enters your vehicle safely onto the pavement
- Check for pedestrians and cyclists before opening a car door
- Leave enough room on pavements for pedestrians, pushchairs & wheelchairs to get past
- ✓ Take care when reversing
- ✓ DO NOT PARK ON ZIG ZAG LINES

Please keep restricted areas clear

- ✓ Zig zags and school entrances
- ✓ Dropped kerbs
- ✓ Resident's driveways
- ✓ Opposite or within 10 metres of a junction- so that children can see cars and cars can see children.

Your questions answered

What would happen if I did park in a restricted area?

If you park in a restricted area you are putting childrens lives in danger and for this reason school parking is regularly monitored and enforced. If you park in a restricted area you could receive a £70 fine.

Am I okay to stop on zig zag markings if I am only there a few minutes? No, under no circumstances should you stop on zig zag markings at any time, these are there to protect school entrances and leave a clear view of the street for pedestrians.

EEP CLEAR

Please park considerately around our schools and keep our children safe!

Don't forget...

Congestion around schools is one of the main reasons given for dangerous parking and there are other ways you could do the school run...

> Never park on zig zags or block school entrances

Parental Controls

Does your child have a games console? If yes, have you set up ageappropriate parental controls? The controls vary across the different consoles, but all will allow you to restrict spending and communication for example.

Does your child watch livestreams?

What is livestreaming?

Livestreaming is when an individual broadcasts video live over the internet. People can watch livestreams from any device that is connected to the internet.

Who is watching livestreaming?

Research from Ofcom reported that 57% of 3 - 17 year olds have watched live streams and the most used platforms to watch live streams were YouTube and TikTok. The research also showed that the



percentage watching content on livestreaming app/sites increased by age. A third of 3-4 year olds were watching live content with this number growing to eight in ten of 16-17 year olds. This is reported in <u>Children and</u> parents: media use and attitudes report 2022 (ofcom.org.uk).

What are the risks?

There are risks associated with watching livestreams that you should be aware of. The main risk being that your child may see or hear something inappropriate as your child may come across themes or content that is not suitable for them. It is difficult to moderate live content as it is happening in real time.

How can I help my child?

• All online platforms have an age rating, ensure your child only accesses platforms that are appropriate to their age. For example, TikTok has an age rating of 13.

• For any platforms that your child uses, ensure appropriate parental controls and privacy settings are applied.

• Take an interest in what your child is doing online and on a regular basis, ask your child to show you what they are accessing.

• Ensure your child knows how to use any reporting/blocking tools on the app that they are using and as always please ensure that your child knows to talk to a trusted adult if they see anything that concerns them online.

Playing games online

Does your child play games online? We have outlined some points that you may wish to consider to try and create a safer experience for your child.

Have you set up parental controls?

As well as setting up appropriate parental controls through the



game's setting, ensure you have set them up on the console/device your child is playing on. For example, many consoles allow you to restrict the games accessed by age.

Chatting to strangers

Some games will allow communication, for example (FIFA and Fortnite). Depending on the game, this may be via the in-game text chat, direct messages or talking through headphones. Some games do offer the ability to switch communication off or restrict bad language so make sure settings appropriate to your child are set up for each of the games they play.

It can be difficult to moderate online chat so ensure your child knows how to block and report other players that make them feel uncomfortable and that they know to talk to you or a trusted adult if they have any concerns. It can also be very easy online for children to behave in a way that they would not if they were face to face with each other. Talk to your child about how they are speaking to others online and encourage them to talk to people online with respect, like they would if they were face-to-face.

Is the game age appropriate?

Before buying the game, check that your child is old enough to play it. All games will either have a PEGI rating or be rated by the App Store /Google Play. UK Safer Internet Centre have published a blog, which shares tips on what to do if your child asks about playing a new game:

In app purchases

In addition to the above, you should be aware of in app purchases as lots of games include the option to purchase additional items/subscriptions so ensure you do not have payment cards saved or set up restrictions/pin code to approve.
