As we end our fifth full week back in school it is amazing to see the significant amount of reward points that our pupils have accumulated for 'Excellence' in a very short space of time. Reward points can be given for a number of reasons including 'Excellent Homework' or an 'Excellent Contribution in Class' or for 'Representing the School' or an 'Act of Kindness'. An amazing 26236 points have been achieved so far this term which contributes 1p for each reward point raised to our chosen charity for this term which is 'Healing Little Hearts'. 'Healing Little Hearts' is a UK based registered children's charity that provides free heart surgery to babies and children in the developing parts of the world.

It is also impressive to see so many children working towards the 'Best of Broughton Award'. This is an award the pupils will work on throughout the year with the aim of completing all aspects of the challenge. To achieve this award pupils will need to complete all eight challenges below.

- 1. Achieve at least a bronze award for academic and pastoral achievement in school.
- 2. Have great attendance: this must be across a term.
- 3. Evidence of reading at least 3 extra-curricular books.
- 4. Support a parents' evening, open evening or event that shows willingness and commitment.
- 5. Attend a club or team activity over a minimum of 4 sessions.
- 6. Support a charity by promoting or helping raise funds.
- 7. Help out in a chosen area of school in the pupil's own time.
- 8. Feature in the school newsletter or receive a praise postcard.

Every pupil who manages to achieve this award will receive one of our 'Best of Broughton' badges to wear on their blazer.

Our assemblies this week have been led by Mr Bailey under the theme 'Staying Safe'. Pupils have been reminded about our expectations surrounding some important topics that are widely being discussed in the national media. These include sexual harassment, derogatory language, bullying (including online) and substance misuse such as vaping, all of which are not tolerated at Broughton. Most importantly, pupils were encouraged to seek support if they had any worries or concerns through any of the avenues available to them, such as our Pastoral team, access to our safe@broughtonhigh.co.uk email address or the wealth of services found on our website under the safeguarding tab. Over the coming weeks, we will also be conducting pupil voice questionnaires to continue to respond to the changing needs of our pupils and ensure the highest possible standards of care.

It is pleasing to see that an overwhelming majority of our pupils arrive to school on time, ready for the beginning of the day at 8.40am. They look smart, alert and eager to learn. As all pupils know, if anyone arrives late they have to attend a 'same day' break detention. Punctuality is such an important lesson for life beyond Broughton and we are determined that everyone arrives to school on time. Please can I also remind you that it is not permitted to drop your child off in the main entrance area between 8am and 9.00am due to the number of buses dropping pupils off and the vast number of conferences we hold at school which start between 8.30am and 9.00am.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind parents about the extensive amount of information on our school website regarding our curriculum in each subject and year group. This important information highlights the full year curriculum and what pupils will be taught and when. We have developed this in detail over the last two years and if you ever require any curriculum content information for any subject you can find this on the school website under the 'Curriculum' tab on the homepage. If you ever require any further curriculum information please contact the relevant Head of Department.

Next Thursday we will be holding our first Year 7 Parents' Evening. There will be a limited number of parking spaces in the front car park with significantly more space at the back of school. All meetings will be held in the junior block (English/Maths and Science rooms). Mr Bailey and Mr Brandwood will also be hosting assemblies in the Junior Dining room about Safeguarding and the use of Synergy. All parents have now received a letter regarding this event and I look forward to seeing you all next week.

Well done to the huge number of pupils who have attended extra-curricular clubs at lunch and after school this week. In particular, our cooking club on Wednesday evening which is always extremely popular and well attended. There was a superb atmosphere (and a wonderful smell) in our food technology area as the pupils prepared vegetable curried dumplings. It was great to see so many pupils from different year groups working and socialising together after school.

- 1. Benedict's Reagent identifies reducing sugars; turning from blue to yellow, orange or
- 2. Large crystals form in slowly cooling igneous rocks as the extra time spent cooling allows them more time to grow.
- 3. In 1928, Alexander Fleming discovered Penicillin. Fleming noticed that mould had developed accidentally on a set of culture dishes being used to grow bacteria. The bacteria hadn't grown around the mould; this mould was from the genus Penicillium.
- 4. Iodine is used to stain onion as it colours starches in cells. In an onion cell it makes the cell wall more visible.

- 5. The particles in solids are held closely in fixed positions. They don't move from their positions so all solids keep a definite shape and volume.
- 6. An ammeter measures electric current, it is measured in amperes/amps (A).
- 7. Hydrogen's atomic number is One. Hydrogen atoms have one proton in their nucleus.
- 8. A fertilised egg has 23 matched pairs of chromosomes. One copy of each from the mother and father.
- 9. In static electricity, when an object gain electrons, it becomes negatively charged. The object that lost electrons becomes positively charged.



Everyone is invited to take part in a survey to help shape future plans for cycling and walking in Lancashire. Lancashire County Council, in partnership with Blackpool Council, want to join up the gaps in our existing network of footpaths and cycle routes and provide safer, direct and more convenient routes.



Following feedback from our initial public engagement last year, the councils have produced a draft network map of cycling and walking networks routes in Lancashire. They need people from all areas of the county to provide feedback on anything you think could be improved. **The survey will be available on their website until 24 October 2023.** Additional design and feasibility work will be needed to take any of the proposed schemes forward.
