Dear Parent/Guardian,

Last night we held our first Year 7 Parents' Evening. It was wonderful to see so many of our new parents in school meeting their child's form tutor to receive an update on how they have settled into life at Broughton High School. Our new Year 7 cohort have made a fantastic first impression and I am sure they will continue to work hard and 'get involved' in all aspects of school life. It was excellent to see so many parents attending the information assemblies throughout the night held by Mrs Boardman, Mr Brandwood and Mr Bailey who shared important information about attendance, Synergy, homework and safeguarding. The resounding message from parents last night was that that they were happy with their choice of school for their child. Attendance at the parents' evening last night was just over 95%.

Year 11 teachers have been collating the necessary data for the first academic review of the year which will be shared after half term. I am really pleased to see such a huge number of pupils making excellent progress since their last review, showing that they have taken on board the feedback from teachers in Year 10 and acted upon it. Year 11 pupils have undoubtedly returned to school with a real determination and maturity towards their final year in school. Pupils will receive their review on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> October following their 'Review Assembly'. The will also receive their 'Mock Exam Revision Guide' which highlights the topics to be revised for each subject, their exam timetable, a revision planner and useful tips on the best ways to revise. Year 11 form tutors will be working with pupils after half term to develop and refine their revision skills.

On Tuesday morning we were honoured to have a visit from the Young Adult author Cynthia Murphy who is a two-time winner of the Lancashire Book of the Year 2022 and 2023. Pupils in Year 9 and 10 listened to an extremely informative and interesting talk about Cynthia's writing process and her journey into becoming an award-winning author.

The focus of this week's assemblies was online safety. Keeping pupils safe online continues to be a theme for us all with nearly all young people having access to a mobile phone. We are constantly updating staff and pupils in school about the dangers that are present online and I know you will be doing the same at home. Below are some useful tips that you may want to discuss with your children:

Keep it Private

- Don't share personal information e.g. your email address or date of birth.
- Turn ON privacy settings to protect yourself.
- Don't add people you don't know.
- Turn OFF location sharing.
- If you wouldn't share with a stranger on the street, don't share it publicly online.

#### Keep it Positive

- Think about how much information you are sharing online.
- If you haven't anything positive to say, avoid saying anything at all.

Keep it Real

- If you wouldn't say it to someone's face, don't say it online.
- Be the same person online as you would be in real life.
- Beware of fake profiles. Other people may not be who they say they are.

Keep it Healthy

- Find a healthy balance with screen time. The internet is designed to be addictive.
- Avoid gaming or any screen time for at least an hour before bedtime.
- The number of 'likes' that you get doesn't define you as a person.
- Ensure the content that you view on line is ALWAYS age appropriate.

Keep Talking

- You can always talk to parents or members of staff if you are worried or uncomfortable about anything online.
- Sometimes you won't know the best thing to do. Don't simply react talk it over first with an
  adult that you trust.

On Thursday next week, Year 7 pupils will be off timetable during periods 1-3 to receive a series of talks on 'Staying Safe'. Year 7 will start the day with a production from Safer Travel, they will then have a number of guest speakers including the Police talking about 'staying safe online' and representatives from Compass Bloom talking about 'Healthy Minds' and how important it is to look after our wellbeing.

Next week we will be holding our first House celebration assemblies where pupils will meet in their individual houses (Beech, Cedar, Hawthorn, Nordmann, Rowan and Sycamore) across Years 7-11. Overall totals for each house will be shared, with the winning house for this term receiving an early break pass and a free chocolate waffle. I am really looking forward to seeing the 'Houses' come together for the first time to celebrate the hard work and effort that the pupils have demonstrated this half term across the school.

When we returned to school in September, we reminded pupils about our approach to the use of mobile phones during the school day. Pupils must ensure that their phones are switched off and put away as soon as they enter the school site in the morning. In line with our current policy, phones must not be out or used at any point of the school day. Once pupils exit the school buildings at 3pm they may then use their phones.

We have been fortunate to secure a grant for £5000 from LCC to enhance some of the cycling facilities and shelters on the school site. It is wonderful that over 200 pupils regularly cycle to school and this is something we want to further encourage and support. Pupil safety when cycling to and from school is extremely important. If your child cycles to school please can you remind them that a fastened helmet must be worn at all times for the whole of the duration to and from school. As the mornings and evenings get darker it is also advised to purchase lights for your child's bike to make them more visible to drivers and pedestrians. Please also remind your child to cycle safely at all times, not only for themselves but for other cyclists, pedestrians and motorists and to be courteous in their behaviour and how they ride their bike.
