Dear Parent/Guardian,

It was wonderful to welcome our pupils back to school on Monday after their half term break. The pupils looked refreshed after their time away from school and extremely smart in their uniforms. Pupils have returned this week with real positivity and a noticeable 'can do' attitude and there has been an excellent learning atmosphere around school. Extra-curricular clubs have re-started and there has been a huge uptake again in the numbers of pupils 'getting involved' in the wider life of the school. What is really pleasing to see is the huge number of Year 7 pupils who are taking the opportunity to try new clubs and activities for the first time. My message to all pupils is to keep attending clubs at lunch and after school wherever possible.

This week in assemblies I have spoken to pupils about what it means to be a pupil at Broughton High School. I shared with them my thoughts about our work to ensure that we strive every day for 'High Achievement', 'Personal Support', a 'Feeling of Community' and for us all, pupils, staff, parents, and governors, to be part of the 'Broughton Team'. I will be accompanied by our Head Boy, Head Girl and their Deputies next week as we lay a commemorative poppy wreath at the cenotaph in Broughton.

Last night we held the first of our Year 11 Parents' Evenings at school where parents and pupils were able to discuss with staff their recent Year 11 progress report that has just been issued. The attendance was excellent again and it was wonderful to see so many families in school. Our Year 11 pupils continue to show a really positive and mature attitude towards their studies and their preparation for their GCSEs in the summer. Thank you to all Year 11 parents for your support last night in the preparation for the mock exams in December

Mr Lord, teacher of Geography and Head of Careers has been successfully appointed at St Augustine's Catholic High School in Billington, starting after Christmas. We are extremely sad to see Mr Lord leave us as he is an excellent teacher, form tutor and a superb leader of our school's careers programme. He is undoubtedly ready to take the next step into middle leadership and I am sure you will join me in congratulating him on his promotion.

On Tuesday we interviewed for Mr Lord's replacement. After a very rigorous process involving four very strong candidates I am pleased to announce that we have appointed Mr Miles Florentine who joins us from Darwen Vale School. He will be an excellent addition to the Geography Department and the school and will also take over the role of form tutor for 8C.

Mrs Fahey visited the Blackpool Grand Theatre yesterday with Year 11 and Year 10 Drama pupils to see 'The Woman in Black'. Although this is quite a scary performance with a number of 'jumpy' moments, I am told the pupils were extremely brave and managed to thoroughly enjoy a superb show. This show undoubtedly helps the GCSE Drama pupils prepare for their practical performances in the Spring Term.

### 1. Cubism

An early 20th-century movement in art, in which subjects are viewed from multiple viewpoints and broken into simple geometric shapes.

Leading Artist: Pablo Picasso.



A 20th-century movement in art which sought to release the creative potential of the unconscious mind; depicted dream-like & strange subject matter.

Leading artist: Salvador Dali





## 3. Fauvism

A style of painting with vivid and non-naturalistic use of colour that started in Paris around 1905.

Leading Artist: Henri Matisse



## 4. Pop Art

Art movement which began in late 1950s in both UK & USA. Subject matter reflected modern popular culture and the mass media.

Leading Artist: Andy Warhol



## 5. Futurism

An artistic movement originating in Italy in 1909. It emphasized speed, technology, youth, violence and objects such as the car, the aeroplane and the industrial city.

Leading artist: Giacomo Balla

## 6. Abstract Expressionism

## 7. Photorealism

A style of art in the late 1960s/early 1970s, characterized by the highly detailed depiction of ordinary life with the precision of a photograph. Leading Artist: Audrey Flack




## 8. Expressionism

A style of painting in which the artist seeks to express the inner world of emotion rather than external reality. Leading Artist: Edvard Munch.



## De Stijl

An early 20th century style of abstract painting developed by Piet Mondrian, using only vertical and horizontal lines and rectangular shapes in black, white, grey, and primary colours.



## 10. Op Art

A form of abstract art developed in the 1960s, that gives the illusion of movement by the precise use of pattern and colour, or in which conflicting patterns emerge and overlap. Leading Artist: Bridget Riley



## **Year 11 Trip to Bridgewater Hall**



On the last Friday of half term, 25 Year 11 pupils took a trip to Manchester's Bridgewater Hall to listen to the Hallé Orchestra perform the 'Orchestra Through the Ages'. This was a fantastic experience for our musicians, and for a large number of them, the first time they had ever heard an orchestra perform live.

The concert was a whistle-stop tour through the development of the orchestra, from the renaissance period right the way through to the current 21<sup>st</sup> Century orchestra. Pupils enjoyed excerpts from Mozart, Beethoven, Wagner and more, with the finale of a performance of Defying

Gravity from the West End Musical 'Wicked' and the theme to Star Wars.

The musicians were impressed by the skill and artistry of the Hallé Orchestra, particularly the way the orchestra could change its sound so dramatically to suit the different pieces of music. The concert was also a great opportunity for our pupils to learn more about the history of the orchestra and the different instruments that are involved, including the way that the orchestra has evolved over time and how new instruments have been added to create the rich and complex sound that we hear today. Tom Redmond, presenter for the concert also discussed key elements of Bach's 'Badinerie' which is our GCSE set work, with the orchestra demonstrating different



features of the piece. This was invaluable as we prepare for the listening component of the exam in the summer.

Overall, the trip to the Bridgewater Hall was a huge success. Our pupils had an amazing time listening to the Hallé Orchestra perform and they learned a lot about the history and development of the orchestra. It was a truly unforgettable experience for everyone involved.

## **History - Year 8**

Year 8 have been studying the English Civil War and this week all classes had the opportunity to handle some reconstructed Civil War-era artefacts in their History lessons. We were visited by Mr Stockley, a member of the Sealed Knot,





who stage re-enactments of Civil War battles. He brought with him replicas of the clothing and weapons used by pike men, musketeers and cavalry men. Pupils had the opportunity to try on the different

uniforms and handle the weaponry whilst discussing their relative uses, advantages and disadvantages, the weight of the armour and just how long it took to load a musket for one shot. I am sure many parents and older siblings will remember Mr Stockley from his time at Broughton and we are very grateful to him for giving up his time and sharing his considerable expertise. Pupils and staff alike really enjoyed the interactive sessions and gained a valuable insight into life as a seventeenth century soldier.



## Talking to your child about sexting

It is important that we talk to our children about the risks of sexting. We understand that it can be difficult to start these conversations though. 'Children 1st' have an area on their website offering advice on talking to your child about sexting and ideas on how to start a conversation:

## Roblox

Roblox is a platform consisting of a collection of games. Players can either create games or play games that other users have created. It is free to download (however subscription options and in game/app purchases are available) and can be played across numerous devices. A lot of the content is user



generated, which may mean not all games will be suitable for your child to view/play. It is important to set up appropriate parental controls for your child.

## What rating is Roblox?

PEGI rate Roblox with a Parental Guidance label, this is because it is difficult to rate due to the huge level of user generated content. It is rated for 'Teens' on Google Play and 12+ on the App store.

## What should I be aware of?

Chat Facility - Players can chat to each other on Roblox. You can turn communication off completely or add restrictions, such as only communicate with friends.

Virtual Currency - Players can buy Robux (their virtual currency) to buy in-game upgrades or accessories. For children under 13, you can set the Monthly Spend Restriction in settings.

**Game content** – as mentioned, users create games so sometimes the content/themes may not be appropriate for your child.

## How do I report abuse and block users?

Roblox have a Report Abuse system so show your child how to use it to report inappropriate content as well as how to block other users. There are different ways of doing this depending on the device being used.

## How do I set up parental controls and a pin?

Parental controls are available within settings. We recommend that you explore the parental controls available and set as appropriate. You can enable a PIN, which means that changes cannot be made without this pin. You can set up Allowed Experiences, which allows you to select age-appropriate experiences, so your child can only join experiences that match their age. Age categories available are for all, 9+, 13+ and 17+. All experiences are still searchable though.

To view content that is suitable for 17+, then a user must participate in a verification process by submitting valid ID.

# TikTok

## You must be over 13 years of age to use TikTok.

TikTok is a social media platform for sharing and watching short video clips. Some of the videos on TikTok may not be appropriate for your child to view and there is also the risk of strangers contacting your child. If your child is using TikTok then make sure the appropriate security/privacy settings are on.



## Account set up

By default, accounts for people under 16 are set to private at the start and we would recommend keeping it as this. This means your child must approve follower requests. As always, it is important that when setting up an account on TikTok, your child enters their real date of birth as accounts are tailored by age. For example, Direct Messaging is disabled for accounts aged 13-15 and they do not receive push notifications from 9pm. In addition, advertisements are tailored to the user's age.

## **Family Pairing**

This allows you to link your own account to your child's account. You can then set controls such as restricted mode (limit the appearance of content that may not be appropriate) and screen time management. ## Inappropriate content, themes and challenges on TikTok

Whilst against TikTok's guidelines, explicit and inappropriate content can be found on this platform, for example nudity/sexual content and hate speech. We often see viral challenges on social media, some of which can be dangerous. If your child is using TikTok, chat to them regularly about what they are viewing.

## **Blocking and Reporting**

# Sensitive Content Warning on Apple devices

Apple released their new iOS 17 operating system in September. One of the new features includes a "sensitive content warning.' You can choose to receive a warning about any photos or videos that might contain nudity before you view them. It also links to related resources and guidance.

If Sensitive Content Warning is activated on your device and the device believes an image/video contains nudity, then your device will blur the image and display a warning so you can choose to view it or not. You can activate this setting in 'Privacy and Security.' You can find out more here:
