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The World is Getting Warmer

What is causing global warming?

By burning fossil fuels and cutting down forests we are increasingly influencing the climate and the earth's temperature. This adds enormous amounts of greenhouse gases to those naturally occurring in the atmosphere, increasing the greenhouse effect and global warming. The earth is slowly getting too hot for us!

What are the effects of global warming?

As the population increases so does the amount of fossil fuels being burned. Fossil fuels contain oil, coal and natural gas and burning causes the greenhouse gas effect which is killing the earth's atmosphere.

How could this affect the future?

Global warming is causing icebergs to melt and forests to burn. As the Earth continues to warm, crucial habitats for animals and plants will no longer be hospitable, putting them at risk.

Stop Plastic Pollution: Be Part of the Solution

Some people may not believe it but plastic pollution is killing animals. Marine wildlife are being seriously hurt by plastic. Sometimes, sea creatures think the waste is prey and end up eating it. They are dying of starvation as their bodies are filling up with

plastic.

Marine plastic pollution has impacted at least 267 species worldwide, including 86% of all sea turtle species, 44% of all seabird species and 43% of all marine mammal species. As the amount of plastic in the ocean increases, it impacts more on the animals. It changes how




they live, it kills them, it gives them problems with digestion and even more. They don't know a difference between food and plastic, so we need to stop littering plastic as it ends up in the ocean. The ocean is now filled with around 75 to 199 tons of plastic. This is causing animals to go extinct. Plastic pollution has become one of the most pressing environmental issues, as rapidly increasing production of disposable plastic products overwhelms the world's ability to deal with them. The ocean is gorgeous so why destroy it? We need to cut back on our use of plastics and make sure we step up efforts to recycle it in our home.

What are 5 facts about plastic pollution?

1. Only 9% of all plastic produced is recycled.

2. A whopping 2 million plastic bags are used every minute worldwide.

- 3. Single-use plastics are illegal in some parts of the world.
- 4. Every minute of every day a truckload of plastic is dumped into the ocean.
- 5. 73% of beach litter worldwide is plastic.

Meanwhile on the other side of England, Manchester united went through a 93-minute struggle until Scott McTominay pulled a rabbit-out-the-hat moment for United. His injury time equaliser was not enough to take the weight off Ten Haag's shoulders as Brentford fans were singing: "You're getting sacked in the morning!" he may not have been in any imminent danger, but he knew how important getting a last-minute winner would be for his managerial role. And after a nervy VAR check, United stayed level and in with a chance.

After what was the last kick of the match, Scott made another beeline for the ball after Harry Maguire gave a header that floated into the box and found the angelic feet of United's saviour Scott McTominay to seal Manchester United's victory. As a spectator and supporter at Old Trafford that day I must comment personally that the performance that day was poor in terms of chances created and executing final products.

Manchester City charged for breach of FA regulations

After an enthralling 94 minutes of football, Manchester City provided a fiasco that broke Fa regulation and offences towards referees. A number of City's players rushed towards referee Simon Hooper when he played advantage after a foul on City striker Erling Haaland in the closing stages, only to then stop play moments later when Jack Grealish was through on goal. Haaland, who was one of several players to remonstrate with Hooper about the call, later criticised the decision on social media.

The FA's statement read: "Manchester City have been charged with a breach of FA Rule E20.1 after their players surrounded the match official during the Premier League fixture against Tottenham Hotspur on Sunday 3 December 2023.

"It's alleged that, during the 94th minute of the fixture, the club failed to ensure their players do not behave in a way which is improper." City have been given until Thursday, December 7 to respond to the charge.







Tuesday 13th 2023 Manchester United hurtle out of UCL with an anti-climactic defeat

The pressure continues to mount on Manchester United boss Erik ten Hag after The Red Devils crashed out of Europe courtesy of a 1-0 defeat to Bayern Munich at Old Trafford.

United needed a victory coupled with a draw in the match between FC Copenhagen and Galatasaray to book a spot in the UEFA Champions League 16, but they came up well short on a do-or-die evening against the already-qualified Germans.

The hosts struggled to create clear-cut openings but did blow a great chance at the start of the second period when Bruno Fernandes flashed over from the edge of the area.

It proved costly as Harry Kane set up Kingsley Coman 20 minutes from time to ensure the Bavarians bounced back from their 5-1 Bundesliga hammering at Eintracht Frankfurt.

FC Copenhagen's victory over Galatasaray means United finish bottom of Group A and do not even have the consolation of a place in the UEFA Europa League. Bayern were already through as pool winners and will be joined by the second-placed Danes.

United will now switch focus to another crunch Premier League clash at leaders Liverpool on Sunday. Bayern host Stuttgart as second meet third in the Bundesliga.

Singapore



FEMINISM IN THE MODERN WORLD

Feminism in the modern world is necessary as even though women have progressed through the years, and have gained to have equal rights to vote, equal rights to jobs, have equal opportunities for financial independence, through work or through setting up businesses, enjoy equal access to education and more, there is still a gap between men and women. This gap is represented through inequalities, such as women being underrepresented in leadership roles, earn less than men for the same job and have higher rates of violence and harassment against them.

We still see the need for modern feminism when we look at traditions that have been accepted by society. For example, in marriage, tradition shows that women would stereotypically take the name of the man, not the man take the woman's name. Furthermore, in marriage a woman would become Mrs to show that she is married, Miss to show that she is not married and even Ms if she does not want to specify it. However, a man is called Mr regardless of his marital status. This shows how women were given a title to portray if they were married or not and to show if they were 'single' or not. Alongside this, women were also traditionally made to take a man's last name when married to show how she is married and the same name as a man to display her being his 'property'; surely, it is time we abandoned these traditions. It is still rare for a man to take his wife's name after all!

Furthermore, modern feminism is also necessary because in football, the highest paid female players are still only making less than 1.2% of the highest earning male players. The highest Women's Super League player earn roughly £417,000 on average per year, and, although that is a lot, it is approximately 10,000 pounds less than what the average Premier League players earns in a week which equates to over three million per year. This equivalent shows how women earn less than what men do in a week. However, statistics show that 88% of players in the Women's Super League earn under £18,000 a year which when put into relation of what an average Premier League player earns is even bigger of a pay gap between the genders.

Modern Feminism also involves around eliminating gender stratification which refers to the social ranking of genders, where men typically inhabit higher statuses than women. It is the unequal power based on gender and a common example of this is the amount of women vs men in politics. Furthermore, gender-based stratifications have led to exploitation in society. Alongside this, in politics, women hold 35% of senior leadership positions, compared to men who hold 65% in ALL leadership positions, even though women account for over half of the workforce in the United States.



Controversy Online

Safa Murtza takes a look at online behaviour, explaining different types of harmful online behaviours and looking at cancel culture.

What is Online Controversy?

Online controversy mostly contains of online debates, Online bullying, Cancellation, Doxing (the act of searching for and publishing private material about a person, Negative reviews, threats and more. Online controversy is a very popular topic in today's society and the influence that the media and people have on each other.

Media Shaming - Bullying.

Media shaming is attacking an individual or organisation that is most likely to publicly embarrass the target for retribution, mainly, or for some other reason on social media, blogs or online communication. This can have large effects on the target, the target's friends/family, maybe even they have online followers who also have strong opinions and aren't afraid to share them unlike others and if this escalates like it does, and has before, online bullying can turn into threats and into way more that wasn't intended at the start. As a result of this, a small situation like a "harmless" hate comment can switch dramatically.

'Cancel Culture'

Nowadays, social media has become a dominant force in expressing public opinions negatively. With the click of a button, individuals can share their thoughts and views with the world, making it easier for people to hold others accountable for their actions. It is essentially the great democratiser allowing everyone to voice their opinion. Although it is wonderful that in today's day and age, everyone has a right to an opinion and their own viewpoints, is it really all that good if it leads to havoc? It is true that individuals are overly confident when online as no one knows who said what. Accounts are anonymous. So if you were to scroll on: Instagram, TikTok, Twitter even YouTube, it would be overwhelming on the amount of hate comments that are left to discriminate, bully and target the influencer. Ignoring the fact that services could be called and investigations could take place on who's spreading hate crimes, Most influencers, especially those on higher platforms don't want to have to deal with scandals that risk losing followers or shares or likes as that means less money is being made and their popularity goes downhill and one hate comment turns into thousands.

BROUGHTON HIGH SCHOOL MURAL

A new mural has been painted on the walls opposite the bin stores. Artist STANLEY MASON created this wonderful piece of artwork that really brightens up the space. What materials did you use to produce the mural?

Well for the paint I used outdoor masonry paint, I had a blue, a red, a yellow, a brown, a green, a black and a white in big cans. This is a challenge in mixing the colours because when I paint with oil paint on paper, I can have 20 separate colours on my palette at one time allowing me to mix any colour I want. However, with the masonry paint I have only the basics, so you'll notice there are not really any vivid blues or purples in the mural. I have several brushes at my disposal, from thick ones made for interior decorating to the tiniest brush made for watercolours, but as I start and move along with a project, I will usually settle on four or five that I stick to. For a palette I use a couple plastic roller trays. I also use some spoons to scoop out the paint from the paint tins, a metre ruler and some chalk for the sketching stage and various miscellaneous things like a sponge and gaffer tape.

How long did it take you to complete it?

The mural took about 15 6-hour days, 2 days for the turquoise background, one day per subject/vase and some more days to tweak and change various elements. With half an hour for lunch in AR1 at 12 and an apple at 11.

Why did you and the school choose that spot in school?

Mr Botes wanted to brighten the school up and create a quieter, calmer area outside away from the busyness and noise of other areas for kids to come at break and felt that this was an appropriate area. When I was at Broughton high, in this area the bins were out and against the wall and it was all very grey. Now the bins are kept behind a lovely wall of leaves and there is the mural there with some benches either there now or soon to be in front of it so Mr Botes has completely transformed the area.

What was your favourite subject at school and why?

In year 7 and 8 my favourite subject was drama, but in year 9 when I did not have the confidence for drama and I got Ms Smith as my Art teacher, art became my favourite, and it was for the rest of high school and college. I also Liked RE with Miss Harris a lot and the creative writing part of English with Miss Winter.

Which part of the mural is your favourite part?

My favourite part of the mural is the English vase and the business and computing vase. I like the colour scheme of the English vase and the pile of books, and I really like the pink computer on the business and computing vase. I am also very happy with the background colour and the general pastel colour scheme of the mural as a whole.

Why did you choose the images you chose for the mural?

Well, one day I was looking at a bouquet of flowers one and thought that a good idea for a school mural would be an elaborate bouquet in a vase representing each subject. So, when Mr Botes asked me to paint this mural that idea came to mind. Mr Botes loved the idea so I measured the wall and worked out I could fit 9 vases across the wall. In terms of deciding what would go in the vases it was just a case of finding objects that people used in the subject that would look good. I used photoshop to create the elaborate reference photo taking objects from all around the web, the reference looks a real mess, and I realized that I needed a soft pastel colour scheme in order to make it look less chaotic.

How did you get into art?

I used to paint for hours in the kitchen at home from age 1-4 and art was always my favourite subject in primary school. Then I really had a passion for it in year 9 and loved GCSE art while always drawing at home in my free time. When I was younger, it was an escape from the noise and busyness of school and really drifting off and focusing on one thing was great for that, and I've always loved to create things and the more I have the more it turned into a need.

What advice would you give to budding artists?

I would say don't get bogged down with all the rules people tell you, there are so many rules that artists will tell you, teachers will tell you, other students will tell you but there really are no rules. Try as many different mediums, techniques, subject matters as you can and pick out what works for you, you'll be happiest with your work if it's what you want to do. However, when starting out make sure to listen to as much advice as you can and try it! Another piece of advice for the GCSE artists would be to think outside the box. Don't paint the first thing that comes to mind when given a brief, because chances are someone else has had that come to mind. Really think through your ideas and avoid the cliché pictures that loads of students do like 'someone's face in a bath surrounded by flowers' or 'the earth melting'. Try and think of something new with your ideas, if you want to paint something simple like a little flower go for it, like I said there are no rules, but I would avoid the cliché pictures. Also, I would say to write your ideas down, try lots of different types of equipment and mediums to see what you like, look for artists you really like on Instagram and in galleries to inspire you and paint in an environment you're comfortable in.

The London Trip

An Interview with Cynthia Murphy

Two-time Lancashire Book of the year winner Cynthia Murphy recently visited our school to speak to pupils in year 9 about her life as a writer.

Cynthia is based in the North West of England and became TikTok famous because of her books including Win, Lose, Kill, Die and Last One to Die. Newspaper Club managed to get an exclusive interview with her after she finished signing books for the pupils!



What made you get into writing?

"I loved reading and I would love to read everything and could always guess the ending. I liked books with a good twist that's why I wanted to write my own."

Why did you want to write horror/thriller?

"I hated Halloween attractions and it made me like it in a safe way. Once we went with my friends and I ended up grabbing her arm and throwing her I was that scared. But writing these books made me feel safe about it.

What are your top three books?

"My favourite books are The Historian by Elizabeth Kostova. Another is Dracula by Bram Stoker. My 3 favourite books is Pet Cemetery by Stephen King."

What is your favourite book that you have written?

"My favourite book that I have written is always the book I've just finished because it's always nice and shiny when it gets published. However, if I had to choose it would be Win Lose Kill Die because this was the book that made me become an amazing writer".

How did it feel winning YA thriller book of the year?

It felt amazing because I got to meet everyone. It was nice being nominated and I felt great because I was the first woman who got nominated twice. I was so ecstatic.

What would be your advice towards aspiring authors?

"I was 28 when I became an author. I wish I'd started writing younger but it is still amazing to have books published at 28 it felt like such an achievement. For aspiring writers, my advice would be to persevere and keep going, but be prepared for people to say no to you. In school, one of my teachers accused me of plagiarism because she thought I had copied my writing from somewhere else. When I published my first book, I wrote this story in my Amazon bio for my book description and someone showed it to my old teacher. She actually contacted me after that!"

What do you think the hardest thing is about being a teenager?

"When I was a teenager, I never felt fully sure of myself and I didn't have much self-confidence. I would say that as a teenager it is so important to believe in yourself."

Why is it important that we ask people to do speeches like this?

How hard was the preparation?

"This was the hardest bit – we applied later so we had slightly less time to write our speeches. It was difficult thinking of ideas and you had to meet a specific criterion and try to get all the ideas into a two-minute time frame."

What were the challenges?

"The main challenges were acting like we had never heard your teammates' speeches before. You also could not repeat anything that was said so you had to be creative with your words."

Do you feel like you benefitted from the day overall?

"Yes — we now have much more confidence about speaking in front of people and it was an enjoyable experience. As a prize, we got a £10 Waterstones voucher, chocolates, and a pen!"

Novels or movies?



The Processed Protest

Tamara Winter gives her thoughts on Ultra Processed Food and the effects it is having on us.

Since 2009, research into the food that we perceive as affordable and convenient has raised awareness that it can be dangerous to our health and manufactured to be highly profitable. Ultra Processed Fare designed to contain? low-cost ingredients, have the convenience of a lengthy use by date and are cleverly branded to entice consumers. Recently, the truth has started to seep into headlines and has shocked people with the harrowing truths about what we put on our plates.

So, what are ultra-processed foods?

Ultra-Processed Foods are any food that is wrapped in plastic, contains one or more ingredient that a person wouldn't typically find in a domestic kitchen, and they typically contain 5 or more ingredients. Dr Chris Van Tulleken (who has done extensive research into the matter) has described UPFs as "an emergency" whilst other medical professionals call for 'tobacco-style' campaigns and warnings for ultra



processed foods. A study at the Melbourne Collaborative Cohort involving over twenty-three thousand Australians proved that people consume more than 30% of their daily diets as Ultra-Processed Foods show a 23% increased depression risk. Furthermore, ZOE revealed that the top five causes of illness and early death consists of smoking and 4 other diet related factors.

The Effects of Ultra-Processed Foods

Some examples of UPFs include; French Fries, cake, cookie, sweets, white chocolate and ice cream. Health care professionals are also urging people to avoid hot dogs, pretzels, diet fizzy drinks, processed pastries and anything that is unnaturally orange. The low fibre content in these foods means people eat more before feeling full and the calories are becoming more concentrated. They are also proving to be highly addictive due to an unnaturally high amounts of neurologically rewarding ingredients that are absorbed quickly by your body due to additives; the food that parents often put on their children's plates are actually manufactured in the same way as drugs. This is why eating ultra processed foods has caused a pandemic of obesity, heart disease, high blood pressure, diabetes, depression and ovarian, brain and breast cancers. They are designed to be almost impossible to escape but the so called 'food' that is filling our cupboards and taking over the supermarkets is rapidly sending the worlds populations health into a vicious and calculated downwards spiral.

UPF Swaps!

Ultra processed foods appear to be inescapable; supermarkets have been consumed by the products.

Consumers have begun to feel suffocated by fake news and temptation. however, making some easy swaps will not just benefit their physical health but a person's mindset and ability to make the best choices when

it comes nutrition. Switching Ultra Processed for minimally processed foods can make a dramatic difference to the number of calories a person consumes in a day.

For example:


